Soul of the Chapter

This story is set in the future when children don't have traditional books and schools. It is set about 150 years ahead. One day, Margie, a little girl in the story, makes a diary entry - 'Today Tommy found a real book'. Tommy, a boy of thirteen years, finds an old book. He has heard from his grandfather that there used to be books and separate spacious buildings for schools. When he finds a real book from the attic in his house, he is excited. Tommy and Margie start reading the book and find a lot of new information about the old system of education.

Tommy and Margie do not have formal schools and human teachers. The next room to their bedroom is their schoolroom. They have mechanical teachers. The teacher has a big screen showing all the lessons and questions. There is a slot where each child has to put homework and assignments for evaluation. The mechanical teachers can be adjusted to fit the mind of the students. If there is any fault, it can be corrected. When Margie's performance is not up to the mark in geography, her teacher is readjusted.

When Margie comes to know about the old schools from the book, she starts hating her school. She likes the old schools more than her own school. She thinks what fun the kids might be having - studying, playing and enjoying together.

IV. Answer each of these questions in two or three paragraphs (100 - 150)

1. What are the main features of the mechanical teachers and the schoolrooms that Margie and Tommy have in the story?

Margie and Tommy have mechanical teachers in their schools. They do not have separate buildings for their schools. The next room to their bedroom is the schoolroom for them. Their teachers are, in fact, robotic teachers. They have sectors of different subjects having set text, speed and level.

The mechanical teachers have a big screen showing lessons and test papers. There is a slot where each child has to put in his homework and test assignments for evaluation. These teachers could evaluate the assignment in no time. They could tell how a child was performing but could never tell why the child was performing badly.

2. Why did Margie hate school? Why did she think the old kind of school must have been fun?

Margie did not like her school. The room next to her bedroom was her schoolroom where a robotic teacher used to teach her every day at a fixed time. She did not like taking tests every day. Her robotic teacher was giving her test after test in geography. Her performance was worsening day by day.

She learnt about the old schools from the book found by Tommy. She learnt that the old schools were located in spacious buildings. All the children from the neighbourhood used to go there together. They laughed, shouted and played together. They learnt the same thing and could help one another in their homework. She thought that these schools must have been fun.

Long Answer Questions

I think, geography sector was geared up so quickly that it was above the level of Margie's age and intelligence. So, she was not doing well in geography. The mechanical teacher was giving was giving her a lot of geography homework. It was very difficult for her to complete the homework. So, her mother was not happy with her performance in geography. However, the County Inspector told her mother that it was not Margie's fault, but the fault was in the mechanical teacher as it was displaying the geography questionnaire so fast that a child could not grasp at all.

How can a machine be a good teacher when it has no emotions, feelings and sentiments? It does not have the ability to understand the psychology of a child. Moreover, the machine only can guide a pupil according to its adjusted modes. So, the machine can never replace the human teacher.

On the other hand, I like today's human teacher who looks into the overall development of the child. In the classroom, I can enjoy fun with classmates. Moreover, today's school is a lovely place because here method of teaching is joyful and stress-free.

My school system is completely different from the school where Margie studies. In fact, they don't have a school at all. They are being taught in their room by a mechanical teacher only. My school is located at a different place. I have a large building and spacious ground. I am taught with my friends. So, I can enjoy their company in the class. I also take interest in



enriched activities taught in the class. To Margie, all this appears to be a fun which is completely missing in her mechanical school. I have good teachers who are humans with human feelings. My school is a lovely place for me because studies here become joyful and stress-free, whereas Margie is being taught and tested by lifeless machines. I am happy with my school system of teaching and love it. Margie hates her school system for being monotonous and boring, sitting in the room with the mechanical teacher.

No doubt machines can teach students more efficiently than humans do. The mechanical teachers are robotic and they can evaluate the assignment in no time. They can tell how a child is performing but can never tell why the child is performing badly. In the story, 'The Fun They Had' Margie was doing badly in Geography because her mechanical teacher was very fast in displaying questionnaire. Moreover, it was above the level of her age and intelligence. The machine could not understand Margie's ability to understand his style of teaching. So, the mechanical teacher was boring to her, and failed to develop an affectionate bond with the child. Whereas, the human teacher can understand the psychology of a pupil. He or she can look into the overall development of the child. Moreover cannot replace the human teacher.
