
Macavity is called the 'mystery cat' and the 'hidden paw' because he is a great criminal.

He's defied many laws and has baffled the Scotland Yard and the Flying Squad.

His eyebrows are deeply lined because of constant thinking, plotting and strategising. His head is highly domed. He doesn't take much care of his appearance and therefore his coat is always dusty and whiskers are uncombed. His head moves from side to side like the movements of a snake. Anybody could recognise him if they keep in mind these characteristics. Yet, he goes untraced the crime scene. This is so because he is also very clever and alert. When people think he is sleeping, he is merely pretending.
